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FOREWORD

Dear members of Rural Youth Europe. On behalf of the board of Rural Youth Europe, I provide the Annual Report for 2023 for your attention.

2023 was a year of rebuilding and emerging from a difficult period of the last few years. We had a full office for the first time in 12 months, enthusiasm was up, and we started to look at areas in which were needed to update the running of the organisation.



Over the spring, the board along with the working group, made up of past Chairs and staff members of Rural Youth Europe, worked on updating the organisation's Charter. This has been a task put on hold over the last few years due to limited resources and other urgent tasks. But this year it was felt that we needed to update the governing documents and a copy was brought to the attention of the General Assembly.

A full year of events were held once again, starting in Budapest for the Study Session at the end of April, before heading to Klagenfurt, Austria in August for the European Rally, before finally finishing with the Autumn Seminar in Georgia in November. In August 2023 and alongside the European Rally in Klagenfurt, we also held our General Assembly. There was a large turnaround in board members once again this year, where we welcomed Fiona O'Leary, Michael Koch, Douglas Jonsson and Ketrin Kastehein into the four group representative roles, 1,2,3 and 4 respectively. As a board we give thanks to outgoing regional board members Shane Quigley, Julija Kordez and Patricija Prindule for their time, commitment and contributions to the organisation over their respective mandates.

Spyros Papadatos (Secretary General) and Tomas Da Cruz Machado (COCOREADO Project Manager) officially started on January 1st, joining Dan Grist in the office and Anja Fortuna (Project manager) joined the office bringing the numbers from 1 to 4 at the start of December. I would like to extend our thanks to the whole team for going above and beyond for the organisation and



helping us end 2023 on a stronger footing compared to where we started. It is appreciated by all within the board and we cannot thank the team enough.

The use of online technology still plays a vital part in our operation even with us now being able to meet up. With everyone living an ever busy and hectic life, we unfortunately were not able to meet in person over the Autumn, so we made great use of virtual meetings to help keep us moving and not staying still.

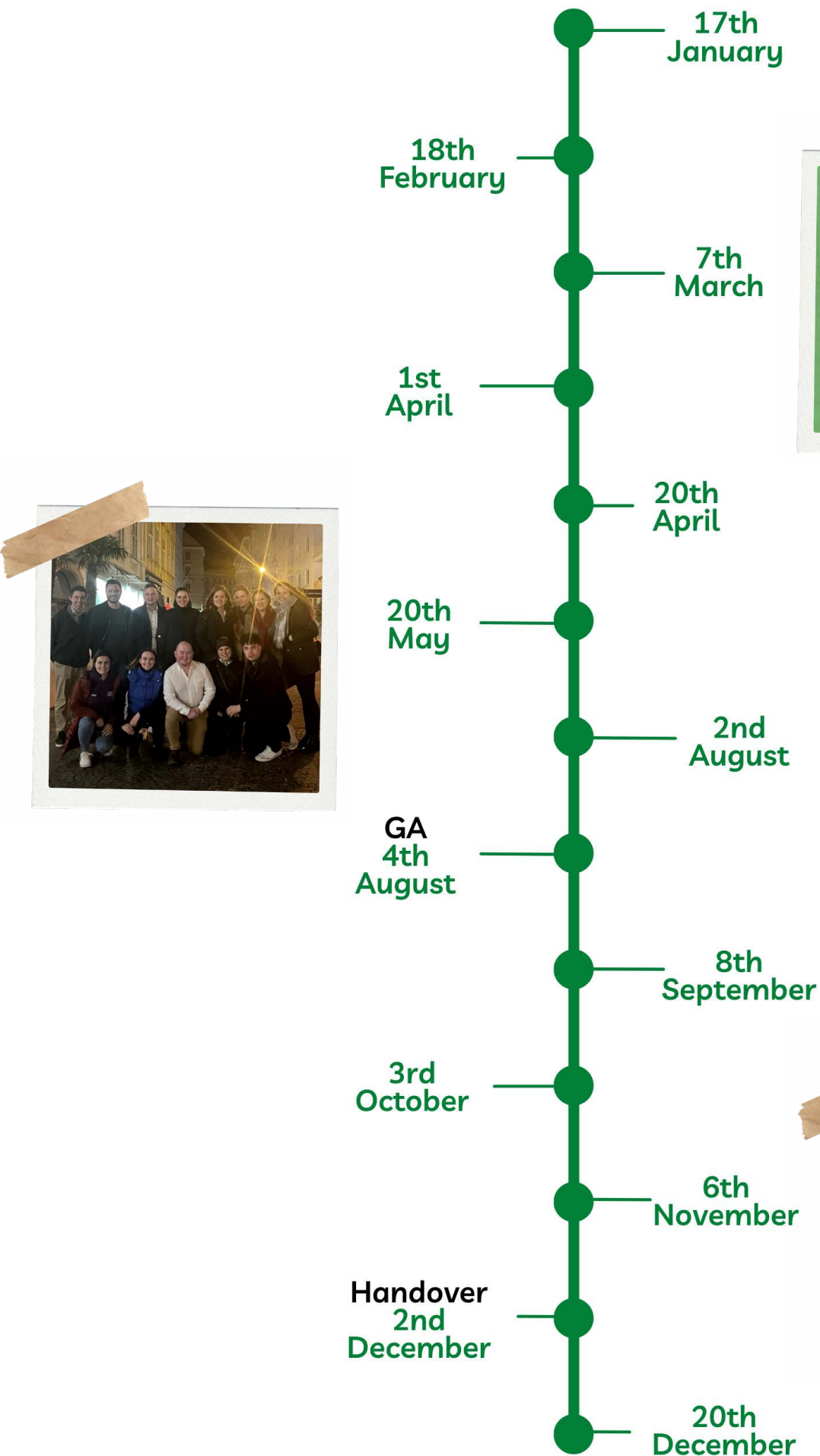

STRATEGY

Rural Youth Europe Strategic approach 2024-2026 'Resilient structures for rural participation and inclusion'

WHAT

In 2024-2026 RYEurope:

- Works as a platform for dialogue on issues that rural youth, organisations and communities face in today's world;
- Provides capacity building and educational opportunities for rural youth for them to be able to claim their rights, participate in society and strive for inclusion;
- Advocates for rural youth to have equal opportunities in Europe and beyond.

HOW

The tools we use are:

1. Non-formal education, youth work and intercultural exchange for rural youth and rural youth organisations;
2. Support for learning through information, youth work, volunteering, and mobility;
3. Policy work.

RESPONDING TO CHANGES

The COVID-19 pandemic drastically changed the society, and is fundamentally affecting several generations of young people even in post-pandemic reality:

How we work on this:

- We take stock of the lessons learnt from the COVID-19 pandemic, and all the consecutive crises that current generations of young people experienced during the last decade;
- We advocate for structural changes and investing in resilient and sustainable structures of participation for young citizens, especially in rural areas;
- We promote synergies and build strong connections among the European rural youth ecosystem, through face-to-face and digital means.

Democracy is backsliding, meaningful participation is challenged, and civic space is shrinking:

How we work on this:

- We create forums for dialogue between citizens from rural areas with policy-makers;
- We promote meaningful forms of youth participation and empower rural young people as active European citizens;
- We build the capacities of rural youth organisations as resilient democratic structures of European societies.

In a world of opportunities, not everyone has equal opportunities:

How we work on this:

- We promote and raise awareness of human rights, especially among young citizens in rural areas;
- We build the capacity of rural youth to (pro)actively address existing inequalities, embrace diversity and equality, and promote inclusion.
- We support the building of more inclusive rural communities through education, mobility and intercultural exchange;
- We advocate for equal opportunities for rural youth, with a focus on intersectionality.

VISION

Young people in rural communities feel part of a larger European community where human rights and equality are respected regardless of opinion, gender, sexual orientation, background and beliefs. Rural youth have equal social rights compared with their urban or suburban peers and their well-being is safeguarded and supported. Rural youth are empowered, educated and supported to be active members of society on the local and European level. The European community has a positive image of rural areas and rural lives. Rural Youth Europe is known among European institutions as an educational organisation, and its learning outcomes are widely recognised.

MISSION

Rural Youth Europe works to enhance the lives of rural young people through providing intercultural learning opportunities which encourage advocacy and respect for others, and:

- Bring together and develop a network of European rural youth in order to enable the sharing and promotion of best practice in an interactive, inclusive and collaborative community. We encourage a safe and supportive environment where young leaders can be empowered to reach their full potential.
- Provide the tools, skills and knowledge for rural youth to develop and be motivated to work towards a sustainable and resilient rural Europe.
- Provide a voice for rural youth to be heard by European institutions and decision makers on key topics. Act as a bridge between decision makers and rural youth in both directions through disseminating information and opportunities back to rural youth.

Study Session

“Respect and Resilience”

Our 2023 study session ‘Respect and Resilience’ was co-organised with the International Movement of Catholic Agricultural and Rural Youth (MIJARC Europe) between the 24th and 28th of April 2023 in Budapest, Hungary, hosted by the European Youth Center in Budapest. The aim of the study session was to support rural youth clubs and rural youth organisations to build sustainable and resilient youth structures, to help them improve the lives of young people, with a focus on mental health.

During the study session, our 36 participants delved into the dimensions of resilience, exploring how it relates to personal well-being and sustainable development. They discussed the importance of cultivating resilience in the face of challenges, such as climate change, social inequalities, and mental health issues. Through sharing their perspectives, experiences, and insights, participants gained a deeper understanding of the critical role resilience plays in promoting sustainability and well-being.



The study session yielded significant outcomes, empowering participants with practical tools and strategies to enhance their resilience and promote well-being in their everyday lives. They explored approaches to maintaining mental health, managing stress, and fostering a sense of balance and self-care. Participants also examined the importance of supportive communication and respectful relationships in building resilience and creating sustainable communities.

Furthermore, the study session resulted in the development of a comprehensive resource, the “Respect and Resilience Guidebook,” which served as a valuable tool for participants and their respective organisations. This guidebook provided practical guidelines, best practices, and recommendations for fostering resilience, promoting mental health, and nurturing well-being. By collaboratively creating the guidebook, participants ensured that it captured diverse perspectives and reflected their shared ownership over the outcomes of the study session.

European Rally

"Grow, Eat, Repeat - the Circular Economy of Food"

This year's Rally took place from the 30th of July until the 6th of August 2023 in Klagenfurt, Austria.

66 participants from 10 countries, 13 nations and 18 prep team members were part of this event. Some of them already knew each other from the last Rally in northern Germany or from other events. For others, it was their first RYEurope event. The beautiful venue of an agriculture school in Carinthia, Austria together with the scenery and relaxed atmosphere at the open-air venue helped to break the ice quickly.

The opening ceremony, at which everyone appeared in their national costumes and dresses, was the official start. A Swiss cowbell played a key role here, as it marks the start and end of every Rally. Once all the group photos were taken and the participants changed back into their everyday clothes, the first sessions got underway. First, we learnt more about the organisations and funders that

made the Rally possible: Landjugend Österreich, Rural Youth Europe, European Youth Foundation and Erasmus+. Right after, we immersed ourselves in our weekly topic "Eat, Grow and Repeat - the circular economy of food". Over the course of the week, we worked our way through food production using many creative methods such as role-playing games, interactive quizzes, and excursions, until we finally learnt about exciting solutions for recycling food and packaging waste.

Each morning there was a group energizer, followed by various sessions throughout the day led by the prep-team with a focus on non-formal education approaches. Every evening there were social activities, to give participants challenges and the necessary space to bond with youth from other countries. For example, during the Sustainable International Buffet where it was possible to taste and explore Europe in all its grandeur. With the 'Fun Olympics' the participants were challenged to do

diverse tasks as a team. And at the 'Sustainable Trivia Night' they had to prove how much they know about sustainability, Europe and songs.

During one day of that week, the participants went to local host families where they spent time with local families and learnt about the culture and life in Austria. The next evening, there was an organized BBQ with their host families and the dance floor was open for learning traditional dances. On the last day, at the closing ceremony, each participant received a certificate for attending the European Rally and when the cowbell rang again, everyone was disappointed that the week was already over!



Autumn Seminar

“Healthy Youth Workers - Healthy Youth”

HHealth is a human right! And recognising health as a human right for young people in rural areas involves addressing the specific challenges these areas are facing. These were the main conclusions of the Autumn Seminar 2023, entitled “Healthy Youth Workers – Healthy Youth” which took place in Bakuriani, Georgia, between Saturday 28th October 2023 and Saturday 4th November 2023.

The Autumn Seminar 2023 was aimed at promoting health as a human and social right and mainstreaming it into the youth work of rural youth organisations. During the week, participants learnt about different aspects of social and human rights, as well as how all this is lined with social determinants of health. A strong focus brought by the participants was on the quality of food in relation to health. They all agreed that agriculture plays an important role in providing quality nutrition that is essential for good health and wellbeing. Among other aspects that were addressed at the seminar like infrastructure, social security, quality education, the aspect of mental health and wellbeing were brought forward as some of the most important issues faced by young people in rural areas.

Among the outcomes of the week, there was also a policy paper on the topic of health as a human right. This

paper advocates for collaborative efforts between local governments and authorities to establish robust emergency services and infrastructure in rural areas. Prioritising emergency response in budgets, enhancing training for healthcare professionals, implementing mobile clinics, and engaging local communities in healthcare planning are essential steps. Additionally, improving transportation services, water conservation practices, promoting healthy food options, launching mental health campaigns, and supporting flexible work arrangements are recommended strategies for creating inclusive and holistic health systems in rural areas.

Participants got to discover Bakuriani and Borjomi, a place in south-central Georgia known for its mineral water and the Borjomi-Kharagauli National Park. A strong connection between participants and the team was formed, leaving everyone happy that they got to experience this amazing week, full of good food and beautiful nature of rural Georgia.

The seminar organised by Rural Youth Europe and Umbrella was co-funded by the European Youth Foundation of the Council of Europe.



The COCOREADO Project



Throughout 2023 and the first semester of 2024, the COCOREADO project was approaching its final chapter, meaning that it was time to consolidate all the work carried out during the previous years and compile all the results, while also disseminating them to local, regional, national, and European stakeholders.

In January, two major events were organised: an online policy workshop on the public procurement policy brief on 24th January and a face-to-face policy workshop in Brussels on 31st January on empowering young citizens towards change for sustainable food systems. Both events were significant to share the COCOREADO framework and developed work on these two topics, among relevant European stakeholders, as DG AGRI and DG RTD.

The project will reach its' end during June 2024 and certainly it can be evaluated an example of an outstanding and successful project, regarding farmers position in food systems, without overlooking the crucial contribution for empowering young citizens from rural areas.

From the establishment of a network of 40 European ambassadors through selection by rigorous criteria, to their training during three training events. The last of which was in Riga in March 2023 and focused on food policy. To the final fine-tuning of seed initiatives and the empowerment of farmers and young citizens for change in food systems. The project has developed major contributions in the general areas: youth and farmers, innovative initiatives and co-creating solutions.

These contributions can be consulted in the educational materials toolkit developed by COCOREADO and in the important policy briefs on public procurement regarding common solutions that can be implemented in future sustainable public procurements

and on youth empowerment. These emphasise the importance of promoting generational renewal in agriculture and making it more attractive to young citizens, so that they consider becoming the farmers of the future. Combined with the dissemination of identified New and Fair Food Systems (NOFAS), these aspects have given an impetus to ensure the rebalancing of the position of farmers as an individual actor, as a key actor in innovative food supply chains and as a supplier for public procurement.

All project outcomes will be presented during the Final Conference on April 2024 in Brussels. Here there will be a review of this 3-year endeavour, in which the 13 partners, jointly with the ambassador network, co-create dmeaningful solutions to overcome obstacles for farmers and to address consumer needs. Also, the focus on youth was a key factor in this project, as it allowed not only to represent young voices in an EU Horizon Project, but also improved the experience of youth organisations in this field, promoting the improvement of important skills and fostering organisational changes to ensure further involvements and contributions in other EU projects.

The COCOREADO project is funded by the European Union's Horizon 2020 Research and Innovation programme.



Policy, Advocacy and External Relations

2023 was the first year when we started focusing more on our presence at the EU level and in Brussels. We started cooperating closely with the European Economic and Social Committee, and we were invited to three hearings: an own-initiative opinion of the EESC on “The role of youth in rural development”, an EESC hearing on the CAP post-2027, and an EESC thematic debate on “Gender Equality in rural areas”. For the first two occasions, our Secretary General, Spyros Papadatos, represented RYEurope, whilst the third one was forwarded to our member organisation from Slovenia (ZSPM) due to their extensive work in the field. In 2024, we will be discussing with the EESC a more structured cooperation for the future, due to our presence in Brussels.

The cooperation with our sister organisations, European Council of Young Farmers (CEJA), and International Movement of Catholic Agricultural and Rural Youth (MIJARC Europe), is continuing strong. The RYEurope Board and Secretary General met with the CEJA Board and Secretary General, and exchanged best practices, while also had the chance to discuss about the future cooperation. With MIJARC Europe, we co-organised the 2023 Study Session in Budapest, Hungary. With both organisations we worked together also in the framework of COCOREADO.

When it comes to policy-making, from the end of 2023 and especially 2024, we tried to use better the outcomes of our RYEurope events to shape our policy positions as an organisation. In 2024, for the first time in the recent history of RYEurope, we will be adopting policy positions in at least two policy areas: the food system and rural youth, and the access to health for rural youth.

In 2023, due to the high increase in external invitations we have been receiving and the high number of opportunities for external representation, the RYEurope Board decided to launch a new internal structure: the Pool of External Representatives (PER). The first call for members of PER was launched in late 2023 and the RYEurope board accepted 16 external representatives coming from all over Europe and the majority of our member organisations. PER will be renewed annually with more external representatives, and the board will be assessing its performance and possible ways to develop it further, in order to continue engaging more and more of our members in the external representation and bringing forward a stronger rural youth voice across Europe.

At the same time, in 2023, our Slovenian member (who is also a member of PER), Eva Kotnik from ZSPM, was a candidate and was successfully elected on behalf of RYEurope in the Advisory Council on Youth of the Council of Europe. Eva will be bringing the rural youth voice to the organisation and its Youth Department, and also contributing on a landmark policy milestone, which is set to be finalised in 2024: the CoE’s Recommendation on Rural Youth.

Lastly, the European Youth Forum (YFJ) remained the main youth platform we engage as a full member. RYEurope has been always engaged at YFJ Policy Commissions and represented in the statutory meetings of the platform by its board members. RYEurope remained an active member of the Exchange Group, a coalition of international mobility of organisations from the YFJ membership, in order to have a stronger voice within the platform.

At the EU level, RYEurope continued as one of the European INGYO’s

taking part in the 9th cycle of the EU Youth Dialogue “Engaging together for a sustainable and inclusive Europe” until June 2023, which covered Youth Goal 3 “Inclusive Societies” & Youth Goal 10 “Sustainable Green Europe”. The EU Youth Conference took place in Sweden in March 2023 and our board member, Julija Kordež participated there and in one of its main panels, bringing the rural youth topics forward. In the second half of 2023, during the Spanish Presidency initiated the 10th cycle of the EU Youth Dialogue, also around Youth Goal 3 “Inclusive Societies”. The RYEurope board member, Fiona O’Leary, participated in the EU Youth Conference in Spain in Alicante, Spain, between the 1- 4 October 2023.



Rural Youth Europe Awards

The Rural Youth Europe Awards were back for 2023 and aimed to showcase the very best of our member organisations across Europe. The awards provide an opportunity for our member organisations to gain visibility for their projects at a European level and celebrate the amazing work of rural youth.

The awards were celebrating projects from within our member organisations carried out between June 2022 and July 2023. There were three award categories:

Rural Youth Project of the Year

A Rural Youth Project is a project where young people have worked together towards a common goal on a voluntary basis. A project in which an individual or group of young people have worked together for the benefit of themselves, their local community or the greater good.

Inspirational Person of the Year

A young person who has set an example for others and who has been truly inspirational in their actions and/or words.

Inspirational Club of the Year

An exceptional club that has set an example to others and has been truly inspirational in their actions and support to their members or local community.

We received entries from across all four groups and a judging process was carried out. The Inspirational Rural Youth Person and Club was judged internally, with the winner and runner-up announced at the European Rally. For the Rural Youth Project of the Year, past RYEurope Board members carried out an internal judging process to choose the three best projects to proceed to the second stage of the competition. After the selections,

a public voting took place on the RYEurope Facebook page. This stage was worth 20% of the overall score with the project receiving the most votes on Facebook gaining 20%; 2nd place 15% and 3rd place 10%.

The winners were announced during the Closing Ceremony of the European Rally in Austria. See the winners of each of the three categories below!

This project includes 11 interconnected activities with the aim to improve youth opportunities to influence decision-making processes in rural areas of Latvia, so youth could feel more confident about their ability to initiate changes and feel that they belong to Latvia.

Media & Communications

Throughout 2023 we continued to communicate with our member organisations and RYEurope supporters and partners via our social media channels, e-newsletter, website and podcast.

Our Instagram is consistently gaining more followers and our Facebook page remains to be a great platform to engage with the wider network and RYEurope alumni. The collaboration feature on Instagram has allowed us to collaborate with our member organisations, with reels in particular allowing us to reach young people further afield outside of our network.

Our monthly e-newsletter is published on the 15th of each month and includes updates from the RYEurope board, news stories from our member organisations and ways that young people can get involved with European projects.

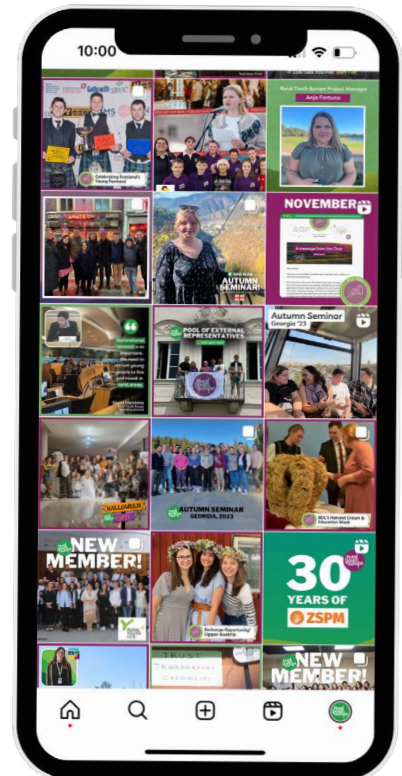
